
Homeless Services Coordinator



- 9.3% question was unanswered




Chronic homelessness -

Chronic Population PIT Totals






Veterans -

- o in safe haven




Veteran Population PIT Totals



Sub populations -

- May be duplicated
- 82 Fleeing Domestic Violence
- 9 HIV/AIDS
- 576 have mental health diagnosis (not including substance use disorder)
- 480 suffer with substance use disorder either currently or in the past



Additional PIT/HIC data

- 12.3 % under age 18
- 4.8% Native American
- Shelter bed decrease
- Permanent housing bed decrease (RRH, PSH,OPH)
- Utilization of shelter beds is down
- Young adult 18-24 population also decreasing

ARE YOU EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS?

Coordinated Entry (CE) connects people experiencing homelessness or those at risk of becoming homeless with available resources. CE includes various Access Points in the community. Access Point staff help assess a person's needs and connect them to the appropriate resources. The purpose of CE is to ensure people are receiving needed resources within a consistent and streamlined approach.

Behavioral Health & Wellness Unit



Purpose

The Behavioral Health and Wellness Unit (BHWU) is a specially trained unit within OPD that engages in a multidisciplinary community team approach for training, planning, implementing and responding to behavioral health related crisis situations. The BHWU addresses the need for early intervention for, and treatment of, those with mental health concerns as a critical step in diverting these individuals from the criminal justice system, unnecessary hospitalization and any potential lasting impact of trauma.











Co-Responder Squad

The Co-Responder's primary responsibility is to respond on scene with a law enforcement officer on calls when behavioral health is identified as a possible contributing factor.

Co-Responders conduct outreach and follow-up calls to individuals who had police contact as a result of a behavioral health crisis, with the intention of getting the individual the help they need to avoid future police contact.

CORE Squad


CORE (Collaborative Outreach, Response, and Engagement)

Sworn officers who wear a "soft uniform" and assist on active 911 calls with a mental health component, and proactive outreach to individuals who have mental health struggles or recent crisis alongside Co-Responders.


